Advent Wreath Prayer: The Candle of Joy

Priest: The third week of Advent we remember the gift of **Joy** we have in Christ. We remember the joy that Mary felt when the angel Gabriel told her that a special child would be born to her – a child who would save and deliver all people. Joy is the gift we all receive from the unconditional love Christ has for us.

Let us pray together – All: Loving God, we thank you for the joy you bring us. Help us prepare our hearts for the Lord’s coming by helping us see that Christ came for every person we meet wherever we go. We ask this in the name of the one born in Bethlehem, Jesus our Lord.

Communion Antiphon: Cf Isaiah 35:4

Say to the faint of heart: Be strong and do not fear. Behold, our God will come, and he will save us.

◆ **FAITH REFLECTION:** ADVENT by Fr Frank O’Loughlin

The feast of Christmas came before Advent was established. The origins of the feast of Christmas are associated with Pope Leo the Great (440-461). He used the symbolism of the shortest day and the expansion of daylight from that day on, which we mentioned in last week’s article. He actually complained that some Christians bowed to the sun as they came into Mass! The first mention of Advent that we have can be dated at 480, but it was not until the late 500’s that we find references to the weeks of Advent along the lines that we have them today.

Advent, as we celebrate it today, has two parts to it. It is based on the four Sundays which precede Christmas and within that time, there is a first part which goes up till 16 December. The emphasis on this time is on the Old Testament texts which are pointing to ‘the One who is to come’, and New Testament texts which show that Jesus is the fulfillment of these expectations. In this time there tends to be an emphasis on the coming of the Messiah which refers both to his coming in history and to his final coming. From 17 December we have the second part of Advent which concentrates on the coming of the Lord among us in his earthly life. So, in these nine days, we have all the passages of the gospels which concern that coming. So, we hear about the events which lead up to Jesus’ coming; the birth of John the Baptist, the annunciation of Jesus’ birth to Joseph (Matthew’s gospel) and the annunciation of his birth to Mary and her the visitation to Elizabeth (Luke’s gospel). Old Testament passages in which these events are foreshadowed accompany those gospel passages.

Advent is a beautiful season in which we are alerted to and invited to reflect on the coming of the Lord in whatever way he comes: his coming in history which we celebrate in his birth, the promised and mysterious coming in which he will be fully revealed and on the ways in which he comes into our lives in the present. Advent is a time for ‘watching and waiting’. We watch for the unexpected comings of the Lord into our lives. We must never forget that the way he came 2,000 years ago took everyone by surprise! They were not expecting him to be as he was! They had to discover him and his ways which were not what they expected. Advent is also a time of waiting. We keep praying during Advent that he will *keep coming*. It is not so much that we are praying for the coming of some event in the far future but rather we are praying that he will keep coming among us and eventually complete that coming. We need to be alert to his word’s capacity to come inside us. We need to be present and open to his Eucharistic coming in every Mass: we pray “Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord”. We need to be alert to people and events in our lives in which he can come to us, make his presence felt. Our constant Advent prayer is *Come, Lord Jesus*.

Pope asks the faithful to pray for God's gift of hope

'Day by day, let us fill our lives with the gift of hope that God gives us, and through us, let us allow it to reach everyone who is looking for it,' the Pope said explaining the intention he would like Catholics to pray for during the month of December.

'Christian hope is a gift from God that fills our lives with joy. And today, we need it a lot. It is easy to get discouraged when you don't know if you'll be able to feed your children tomorrow or if what you're studying will allow you to get a good job. Hope is an anchor that you cast over with a rope to be moored on the shore,' the Pope said, and people of faith must hold on to that rope tightly. As Catholics prepare for the opening of the Holy Year 2025 on Christmas Eve, he asked them to 'pray that this upcoming Jubilee strengthen us in our faith, helping us to recognise the Risen Christ in the midst of our lives, transforming us into pilgrims of Christian hope.'

Gospel Lk 3:10-18

What, then, must we do?

When all the people asked John, 'What
must we do?' he answered, 'If anyone has
two tunics he must share with the man
who has none, and the one with something
to eat must do the same.' There were tax
collectors too who came for baptism, and
these said to him, 'Master, what must we
do?' He said to them, 'Exact no more than
your rate.' Some soldiers asked him in
their turn, 'What about us? What must we
do?' He said to them, 'No intimidation! No
extortion! Be content with your pay!'

A feeling of expectancy had grown among
the people, who were beginning to think
that John might be the Christ, so John
declared before them all, 'I baptise you with
water, but someone is coming, someone
who is more powerful than I am, and I am
not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he
will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire.
His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his
threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into
his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire
that will never go out.' As well as this, there
were many other things he said to exhort
the people and to announce the Good News
to them.



Reflection by Greg Sunter

Is it any wonder that there was a
growing sense among the people that
John might be the Christ? His teaching
in the first part of this week's gospel
might just as easily have come from the
mouth of Jesus. It demonstrates for us
just how much John was preparing the
way for Jesus: even his teaching was in
line with what Jesus would later say. In
this instance, the people gathered
around John (presumably having been
baptised by him) are asking how they
should live out their new-found
conversion of heart. John's response to
the three groups is about the need for
generosity and justice. It is about not
taking more than your share when
someone else does not have sufficient.
To the crowd of people, he instructs
them to give away a second tunic to
someone who doesn't have one at all
and to share their food with those who
are hungry. To the tax collectors, he
cautioned them to collect no more than
what they were supposed to. Tax
collectors made their profit by
overcharging taxpayers. Together with
the fact that they worked for the Roman
occupiers, this made tax collectors one
of the most despised groups in society.
John's caution to them is to be just in
their dealings. He also cautions the
soldiers against intimidation and
extorting money from the people to
supplement their pay. The themes of
justice and hospitality that will echo
throughout the gospel of Luke are
clearly evident in this episode with
John. When the people start to talk
about him being the Christ, John is
quick to point them to the one who is
still to come; the one who will share
with them more fully the love of God
and the fire of the Holy Spirit.

The psalm responses are from the English Translation of the Lectionary for
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St Peter Canisius was born in Holland in 1521. He studied canon law at Louvain, but later came to the conclusion that a legal career and marriage, as arranged by his father, were not to his liking. He joined the Jesuits and spent his time in prayer, study, teaching and care of the sick. St Peter was a prominent preacher and he attended the Council of Trent, then later taught at the first Jesuit school at Messina. He was later called to Rome to work with St Ignatius; the founder of the Jesuit order. After posts as rector and vice-chancellor of the University of Ingolstadt, he was sent to Vienna, which was in need of reform. In 1555, his famous Catechism was published and eventually translated into 15 languages during his lifetime. Considered one of the most influential theologians and writers of his time, St Peter Canisius was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1925.

Archdiocese News

Pope calls 21 new cardinals, including Melbourne's Cardinal Mykola Bychok, to build church unity.

Becoming a cardinal is an insistent call to put Jesus at the center of one's life, to love the poor as he did and to strengthen the bonds of unity within the Catholic Church, Pope Francis said as he created 21 new cardinals from 17 nations. Among them was Cardinal Mykola Bychok of the Ukrainian Eparchy of Sts Peter and Paul in Melbourne, who at 44 becomes the youngest serving cardinal and Australia's highest ranking Catholic.

'To walk in the path of Jesus means, in the end, to be builders of communion and unity,' the Pope told the new cardinals during an afternoon consistory on 7 December in St Peter's Basilica. Drawing on the Gospel reading, Pope Francis warned that the ambition for earthly glory can infect the followers of Jesus today, saying, 'Our hearts can go astray, allowing us to be dazzled by the allure of prestige, the seduction of power, by an overly human zeal for the Lord.

That is why we need to look within, to

stand before God in humility and before ourselves in sincerity, and ask, Where is my heart going? Where is it directed?'

On the cross Jesus fulfilled his saving mission, the Pope said, and he tore down 'the dividing wall of hostility' so that 'all might see themselves as children of the same Father and as brothers and sisters of one another. 'For this reason, the Lord is looking to you, who come from different backgrounds and cultures, and represent the catholicity of the Church,' the Pope told them. 'He is calling you to be witnesses of fraternity, artisans of communion and builders of unity.'

Each cardinal received a scarlet biretta, symbolising their readiness to defend the Christian faith with courage, even to the point of martyrdom. They also received a cardinal's ring, signifying their love for the Church. Echoing the practice centuries ago, when the clergy of Rome elected the Bishop of Rome, each of the new cardinals was assigned a 'titular' church in the city, making them members of the diocese's clergy. Bishop Mykola received the Basilica of Santa Sofia, which will now be his seat Rome. Pope Francis asked the cardinals to wear the cardinals' red as a reminder

of their call to 'be fearless witnesses to Christ and his Gospel in the city of Rome and in faraway regions.'

In his homily, the Pope told the new cardinals that the Lord was calling them to be 'a radiant sign in the midst of a society obsessed with appearances and power' by not arguing over who is the greatest or who is right most often. 'Love one another with fraternal love and be servants to one another, servants of the Gospel,' Pope Francis told them.

A cardinal for Ukraine and Australia

Speaking the next day after Mass at St Peter's Basilica for the feast of the Immaculate Conception, Bishop Greg Bennet said it had 'been an absolute pleasure' to represent the ACBC at the consistory in support of Bishop Bychok. 'We ask the Lord's blessing upon him, [and] for all those who have travelled to Rome,' he said. 'And we look forward to his return to Australia as he continues his ministry among the Ukrainian Catholic community of Australia and New Zealand and, of course, among us, representing our many interests here in Rome.'

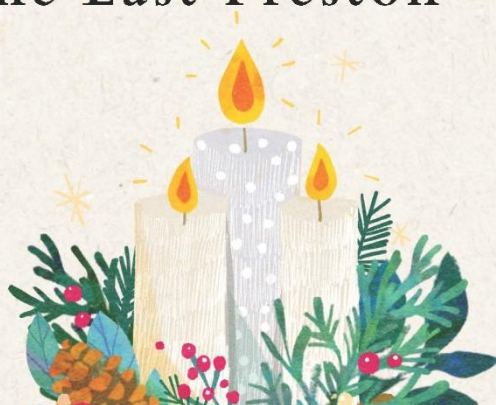
