ICY POLES

lcy poles will be sold during lunchtime each TUESDAY and THURSDAY for Term 1. The cost of an icy pole is 50 cents.

BEFORE & AFTER SCHOOL CARE

If your child is attending the Before and/or After School Care Program, please notify the school Office as soon as possible. We also keep a list of students who attend the Program, showing on what days of the week they attend. This reduces confusion and enables us to know where each child is after school.

Parents who use the Kingsbury staff car park must enter and exit the carpark slowly and safely - being mindful of students who may be around and other cars in the carpark.

MEDICATION REGISTER

All schools are required by law to have a medication register book. When your child requires medication, we require a parent / guardian to fill out this book on what medication your child requires and when the medication is required. Medication must be in its original packaging and the dosage must be specified on the packet and confirmed by the parent in writing. All medication must be kept at the School Office. As a general rule, if your child requires medication for an illness, then they are not well enough to attend school.

BE SUNSMART – WEAR A HAT!

The School Hat must be worn during Term 1 and in Term 4. Children who do not have a school hat are required to sit under the veranda or on the deck at Recess and Lunchtime. (i.e. No Hat, No Play)

5/6 EXCURSION TO PARLIAMENT







CSEF ELIGIBILITY

Below are the criteria used to determine a student's eligibility for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF).

Criteria 1 - General eligibility

To be eligible for the fund, a parent or carer of a student attending a registered Government or non-government Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- · on the first day of Term one
- · on the first day of Term two
- a) be a holder of one or more of the eligible financially-means tested cards OR be a temporary foster parent,
 and:
- b) submit an application to the school by the due date.

For the list of eligible financially-means tested cards refer to the CSEF Policy: https://www2.education.vic.gov.au/pal/camps-sports-and-excursions-fund/policy

Parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with the above.

Criteria 2 - Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooled, or TAFE.

Special Consideration

A special consideration category exists for

- Families on a bridging visa, temporary protection visa, in community detention or are asylum seeker families
- Students in temporary out of home care arrangements, including statutory kinship care

Eligibility Date

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/carer concession card being validated successfully with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (30 January 2023) or term two (24 April 2023).

PAYMENT AMOUNTS

CSEF payment amount

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

- Primary school student rate: \$125 per year.
- Secondary school student rate: \$225 per year.

The CSEF is paid directly to your child's school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.

For ungraded students, the rate payable is determined by the student's date of birth. For more information, see: www.education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

Year 7 government school students who are CSEF recipients are also eligible for a uniform voucher. Secondary schools are required to make applications on behalf of parents/carers so please register your interest at the school.

HOW TO COMPLETE THE APPLICATION FORM

NOTE: ALL SECTIONS MUST BE COMPLETED BY PARENT/LEGAL GUARDIAN

Complete the PARENT/CARER DETAILS section.

Make sure that the Surname, First Name, and Customer Reference Number (CRN) details match those on your concession card. You will also need to provide your concession card to the school.

If you are claiming as a temporary Foster Parent or a Veteran Affairs Pensioner, you will need to provide a copy of documentation confirming your status as a temporary Foster Parent or provide your Veterans Affairs Pensioner Gold card to the school

If you are seeking special consideration, mark this in the form and provide a copy of the relevant documentation.

- 2. Complete the STUDENT/S DETAILS section for students at this school.
- Sign and date the form and return it to the school office as soon as possible. The CSEF program for 2023 closes on the 23 June 2023.

UNDERSTANDING OUR FAITH

REFLECTION: OUR MASS BY FR. FRANK O'LOUGHLIN In this short series, let's look at 'Mass' and at each of its parts.

A good place to start is with the formal description of the Mass given in the official Roman Missal itself. We find this description in the Introduction to the Missal in no. 27. It says: "At Mass or the Lord's Supper the people of God is called together, with a priest presiding and acting in the person of Christ, to celebrate the memorial of the Lord or Eucharistic Sacrifice." Notice that the celebration of the Mass is seen as something done by the whole People of God. The priest's role is made explicit, but he is there to fulfil one particular ministry. He does not celebrate and the People of God join in, rather the whole People of God celebrates and within that celebration, the priest has a crucial part. I don't think that this principle has been put into effect sufficiently in the celebrations. It seems to me that both among the people and among priests, the Mass is too often seen as something which the priest does and which the people take part in at a secondary level. It is still too often "Father's Mass"! This has been a way of thinking among Catholics for a very long time and for that reason has become the spontaneous way in which we tend to think when we are not thinking, so to speak. To encourage a situation more in line with the actual official description of the Mass, takes time to think about it and to understand and to discover this new – but also ancient - way of thinking. As this series goes on, we will look at the meaning of the various parts of the Mass and what sort of things might be more in line with the above description.

REFLECTION: BLESSED ARE THE POOR AND THE HUNGRY Today in the Gospel we are presented with St Luke's 'Sermon on the Plain'. Unlike Matthew who gives us the 'sermon on the mount', Luke has Jesus gathering his disciples on a piece of level ground. It tells us something of how Luke understands the type of community that Jesus is creating: equality before God. The text itself is both consoling and challenging. Let's just look at two of the blessings: Blessed are the poor and blessed are the hungry. "Blessed are you who are poor"- Poverty is not, per se, a blessing, yet poverty can help us acknowledge our dependence on God. When we have plenty, it can be all-tooeasy to forget about God. In this sense, "Woe to you who are rich, for you have been consoled," makes sense. On the other hand, because poverty puts our dependence squarely before us, indirectly it can be a blessing. It's possible, then, for people who aren't poor in the financial or material sense to be "poor in spirit." Christians are called to recognise our dependence on God for everything and treat our possessions (even our abilities and skills) as gifts, using them for the building up of the Kingdom of God. "Blessed are the hungry" - likewise hunger is indirectly a blessing. Those who hunger are blessed because their hunger provides a chance to realise their dependence on God and that one day the hungry shall be satisfied. They shall have their fill of that for which they hunger. That day is now according to the gospel of Luke. Which is why Jesus called all to a level piece of ground, where there was access for everyone and puts before them his words and ultimately his body for their nourishment. That same gift is given to us today in word and sacrament whenever we gather for Eucharist.

ARCHDIOCESE NEWS

POPE FRANCIS APPOINTS AUXILIARY BISHOP OF SYDNEY

Fr Tony Percy, 62, is currently the parish priest in the Archdiocese of Capherra and Goulburn parish of St Gregory's Queanbeyan

Canberra and Goulburn parish of St Gregory's, Queanbeyan. His episcopal consecration is scheduled for 2 May at St Mary's Cathedral in Sydney. 'Fr Tony will bring to his new role as bishop a wealth of experience from his parish ministry and leadership of the seminary in Sydney,' said Archbishop Costelloe. Ordained priest in December 1990, Fr Tony served in the parishes of Young, Queanbeyan, Ariah Park, Ardlethan and Barellan. Following theological studies in the United States, he served as parish priest in Goulburn before being invited by Cardinal George Pell in 2008 to head the Seminary of the Good Shepherd in Homebush, Sydney. Fr Tony returned to Canberra in 2015 to be vicar-general of the archdiocese, during which time he served in the parishes of Wanniassa and Queanbeyan.

WATERS OF LOURDESREACH ST PATRICK'S ANNUAL MASS

On Saturday 9 February, hundreds of faithful from across Melbourne gathered at St Patrick's Cathedral for the Lourdes Day Mass—a cherished annual opportunity to pray for the sick and infirm. For those unable to visit the Marian shrine of Our Lady of Lourdes in France, this Mass—held each year on or near the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes (11 February)—brings those facing health challenges closer to its grace, allowing them to receive the healing waters that flow from the sacred site. Now in its 15th year, the Mass is organised by the Order of Malta Australia. The devotion to Lourdes dates back to 1858, when Our Lady appeared in a grotto to Bernadette Soubirous, a young French peasant girl. Instructing Bernadette to dig in the ground, Mary revealed a spring with healing properties that continues to flow to this day. Bishop Curtin described Lourdes as a place 'where the sick come constantly to call upon God's help, to take inspiration from Our Lady, and in doing so to find healing of heart and soul and body.'

WORLD DAY OF THE SICK 2025

To mark the 33rd World Day of the Sick on 11 February, Pope Francis reflected, "How can we be strong, when our bodies are prey to severe, debilitating illnesses that require costly treatment that we may not be able to afford?' In these situations, we sense our need for a strength greater than our own. We realise that we need God's help, his grace" Pope Francis wrote that God remains close to those who are suffering: through encounter, gift and sharing. 'How often, when we care for those in need, do we discover love". The Catholic Church's World Day of the Sick, established by St John Paul II, is held each year on 11 February, the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. It is an opportunity to devote special attention to the sick and to those who provide them with assistance and care, both in health care institutions and within families and communities.

First Reading Jer 17:5-8

A ourse on those who trust in humanity; a blessing on those who trust in the Lord.

The Lord says this:

'A curse on the man who puts his trust in man,

who relies on things of flesh, whose heart turns from the Lord. He is like dry scrub in the wastelands: if good comes, he has no eyes for it, he settles in the parched places of the wilderness,

a salt land, uninhabited.

'A blessing on the man who puts his trust in the Lord,

Last Sunday we heard Jesus call Peter to be his disciple. Jesus then travels with Peter and the other disciples. Luke reports acts of healing (a person with leprosy and a paralytic man) and the call of Levi, the tax collector. Jesus also replies to questions from the Pharisees regarding fasting and the observance of the Sabbath. In the verses immediately before today's gospel reading, Jesus is reported to have chosen 12 men from among his disciples to be apostles. Apostle is a Greek word that means "one who is sent"

Today's gospel reading is the beginning of what is often called the Sermon on the When spoken from the mountaintop in Matthew's Gospel, we can't miss the impression that Jesus is speaking with the authority and voice of God. The mountaintop is a symbol of closeness to God. Those who ascend the mountain see God and speak for God; recall the story of Moses and the Ten Commandments. As Luke introduces the location of Jesus' teaching, Jesus teaches on level ground, alongside the disciples and the crowd. Luke presents Jesus' authority in a different light. He is God among us.

Luke's Sermon on the Plain is addressed to Jesus' disciples, although in the presence of the crowd; Matthew's Sermon on the Mount is addressed to the crowd. In keeping with this style, the Beatitudes in Luke's Gospel sound more personal than those in Matthew's Gospel—Luke uses the article "you" whereas Matthew uses "they" or "those."

Those who are poor, hungry, weeping, or persecuted are called blessed. Those often thought to have been forgotten are called blessed. Riches, possessions, laughter, reputation . . . these are not things that we can depend upon as sources of eternal happiness.

The Beatitudes are often described as a framework for Christian living. Our vocation as Christians is not to be first in this world, but rather to be first in the eyes of God.
